3 DIVISIONS

1st-5th grade 6th-8th grade 9th-12th grade Read the story from My Name is Aram "The Summer of the Beautiful White Horse." After reading, locate the prompt that corresponds to your grade level, and write your response according to the instructions.

WRITING PROMPTS

1ST - 5TH GRADE | What does honesty mean to you? Write a paragraph about why honesty is important. You can write about a time when you chose to be honest, or you can write about someone you admire who is honest. You can also draw a picture to go with your paragraph.

6TH - 8TH GRADE | Write a narrative essay of at least 300-500 words explaining a time you faced a moral decision in your own life. Use descriptive language to tell what happened, and then reflect on what you learned from the event about your own moral identity and belief system.

9TH - 12TH GRADE | Literature often explores the idea of how morality is defined, and many utilize a character who is tempted to make a decision that runs counter to his/her sense of morality, loyalty, social position, or upbringing. In William Saroyan's "The Summer of the Beautiful White Horse," Aram is tempted to act against his moral, social or spiritual foundation. In a well-organized essay, discuss what decision the character makes, what factors contribute to his decision, and analyze how the story reflects the question of how we all determine our own moral identity and belief system.
